

In the burgeoning area of Vadodara, Namasya is nestled amongst the upcoming high rise residential buildings enclosed with the beautifully crafted landscape around it.


As the sun rises on the horizon, the day of Nehulji(client) begins with the Munias and parakeets chirping, awaiting their breakfast. During his daily morning routine, he shares the verandah space with these prairie creatures.


Easy to spot on the road this singular ground floor residence stands out with a fusion of exposed brick work and form finished concrete structure creating a captivating blend of robust and docile.

At the intersection of the geomagnetic grid lines and the Vastu chakra stands Namasya, a 6000 sqft residence. The 500 sqft courtyard at the core, is the Brahmasthan—the cosmic centre with an 8'0" wide walkway encircling this sacred space. Like a protective embrace, it links the living spaces, creating a seamless flow. The long tunnel like passages weaving through the residence allows cross ventilation with cooled air, filtered by the trees.






The Glass Screen has designed stain glass in the center done by stain glass artist (Mr. Jatin Patel) in Vadodara.

The foyer gracefully introduces the courtyard through a bespoke stained glass partition crafted by Artisan Jatin Patel from Vadodara. This design element not only adds a touch of artistry but also offers a glimpse into the thoughtfully planned outdoor space. The courtyard itself is a masterclass in understanding and respecting natural light patterns. Shade-loving plants such as ferns, philodendrons, and carnations flourish on the south side, while sun-loving species bloom in the sunlit areas. Some exotic plants have found a perfect home in this cultivated micro-climate, their survival a testament to the harmonious dialogue between architecture and nature.

The Deep Stambh is a monolithic Black marble stone chiseled by sculpture (Deepak Mahakul) in Vadodara. Its a silent water feature that gives a trickling sound in the courtyard.



The living room exudes a formal yet inviting aura, with a striking wooden false ceiling that envelops the space. The expansive East-facing window opens onto the garden, where a white marble sculpture serves as the focal point, creating a tranquil connection to the outdoors. Curated loose furniture from Alankaram and Tectona Grandis, alongside a floor lamp by Manish Maheshwari and a solid white marble egg-shaped center table, complete this refined yet comfortable setting.



A beloved tradition in Gujarati households is the evening ritual of sitting on the 'Jhula' (swing) with a cup of tea. This home features a modern interpretation of the classic design, incorporating green marble and an inlaid yellow Jaisalmer carpet. The Jhula is placed within a space that takes full advantage of the cool, pleasant winds filtered through wind tunnels and the surrounding greenery, making it ideal for intimate gatherings and leisurely conversations. The credenza in the room showcases a striking combination of rosewood, Burma wood, and Kapoor wood, further elevating the room's richness.

A skylit passage connects the dining space to the kitchen, flooding the area with natural light. The kitchen's fresh pista green hue complements the wooden tall units, while the wooden handles feature beautifully wood-burned patterns of Saras cranes, adding a touch of whimsy.






Pathway connecting Kitchen and dining with skylight

The dining area provides a seamless transition between the central courtyard, rear verandah, and dining space. A custom-designed stained glass and plain fluted glass light fixture illuminates the dining area, adding a touch of elegance.

The guest bedroom embraces a rustic charm, with a wooden bed that becomes the room's centerpiece. The bed is paired with a form-finished RCC wall, providing a bold backdrop. A daybed from Alankaram is placed by the window, offering the perfect spot to unwind and enjoy the serene courtyard views.



The master bedroom radiates warmth, with an intricately designed teak wood bed surrounded by wooden fins that create an intimate, cocoon-like atmosphere. The wooden backdrop is complemented by handwoven wall hangings from THE RUGSTORY, adding texture and depth.





Restaurant caters to diverse preferences, offering cosy corners for intimate gatherings and vibrant communal spaces for social dining. The goal was to craft an atmosphere where aesthetics and functionality work together to enhance the overall dining experience.

Restaurant's façade welcomes guests with a muted terracotta sign, surrounded by lush greenery that sets the tone for an organic, nature-inspired experience.

The interior design focuses on an elegant yet warm atmosphere, featuring a rich palette of soft green, roast brown, warm beige creates a restful ambience.


Thoughtfully designed lighting elements, including sculptural pendent lamps and wall sconces add warmth while the metal chandeliers hanging from tree branches lends a storybook charm to the place.



Large windows introduce abundant daylight while fostering a connection to the lush outdoor greenery. Tables sit along the glazed periphery, offering diners the perfect point to observe and experience the indoors and the outdoors in equal measure. Another very important criteria we had to keep in our minds while designing was to customer should have to feel relax. The 10 week timeline quantifies the magnitude of brainstorming and workforce. But as said 'All that's well ends well' as it turned out, was an iconic space created in the heart of the food city Kolhapur.



Crafted wooden chairs with upholstered seats ensure ergonomic comfort. From the moment guests step in, they are enveloped in an atmosphere of warmth and sophistication. The layout fosters an effortless flow, allowing guests to enjoy their meals in a comfortable and aesthetically pleasing setting. The space is visually anchored by handcrafted botanical artwork and striking fish paintings.

#### Concept & Description –

Sprawled across four storeys and 8400 sq.ft. this suburban residence is an amalgamation of Indian and contemporary aesthetics, tied together by the flavours of Nashik. Designed by Jonquil Design Studio, this colossal home belongs to a family of six; a family rooted in tradition, one that practices the art of hospitality through the myriad of social spaces interspersed in this transcendent haven.

Entering from the West, the ground floor houses the parking area, along with the servants' quarters and a home office. This area transforms into a pious place of celebration each year during Datta Jayanti when the family invites devotees for a Maha Pooja. To the north, a water cascade directs you upstairs, to the main entrance of the residence.





Upon entering, you are ushered into the formal living space that opens out into the family space decked out in all white. It culminates into a small balcony on the western end while expanding into the communal spaces on the east. Across is the pooja room, featuring a backdrop of limestones, engraved with shlokas. A screen drawing inspiration from temple musical instruments cocoons it from the main space. The dining room lies next to the pooja room and leads to the navy blue and white kitchen. On the other side, a stepped, basalt platform forms the base of the staircase, lying in the eyeline of the pooja room, reminiscent of the temple ghats. This stepped platform evolved as a space for congregation and celebration, akin to a typical temple katta.

While climbing up the stairs, your vision is drawn upwards, towards vertical lines punctuated by grape leaf impressions on the stairwell wall. Capturing the true essence of its context, the wall is an interpretation of the Nashik vineyards. The second floor houses a courtyard that captures the elements of earth, water and the sun. A brick-laden wall makes its way onto the floor and creates a nook ideal for hosting classical music shows. A pair of insitu benches delineates the performance space. The family room lies just beyond, while the primary bedroom and a guest room complete this floor.





The main bedroom encapsulates the energy of the house. Finished with neutral yet traditional furnishings, it looks out onto the corten steel facade. Outlined in the shape of hibiscus petals, this facade is an important detail that gets better with age as it oxidises, turning into a timeless element that lends this residence its identity. The western sun rays cast a wondrous play of light and shadows into the interiors. This hibiscus-inspired facade acts as the welcoming element to the beholders of the residence, inviting you into this space that celebrates community, craft and culture.

The third floor is home to three bedrooms and a study. The elder son's room emulates a Japandi vibe with light wooden tones and rattan accents. The younger son's bedroom takes on a two-toned theme with brick red accents on a creamy white backdrop. A jharoka-style window peeks into the double-height volume of the musical nook. The three ensuite bedrooms belong to the residents and feature walk-in wardrobes. All have been tailored to the individual tastes of its inhabitants, giving this residence a complex character.



The uppermost floor is a mix of open terraces and enclosed entertainment spaces including a gym, home theatre and saunas. At the front, a bar, a jacuzzi and a terrace lounge invite you for a soulful retreat. A terrazzo outdoor garden acts as an open-air yoga room on the far side.

While all the personal spaces have been customised for comfort, it is the focus on common spaces that brings this house to life. The residence is contextualised by the use of local materials and Indian aesthetics. For a residence of this scale, environmental measures are also put in place. Solar panels power more than 80% of the house, with sensor motion lights, low VOC paints and Indian stones used throughout.



This residence weaves a symphony of local flavours through its distinctly designed common and private spaces. The conscious play of volumes welcomes the viewers to explore the house in their own ways. With a focus on creating places of congregation, this house is the epitome of warmth, rootedness and belonging.

The Designed Studio is a small cozy space carved out in such a way that it reflects our design philosophy. The Studio has been designed following a very minimalistic approach towards its interiors.

Cement polish becomes the core finishing material of the space commencing from the floor continuing on to the walls and ceiling making the space appear bigger forming a monolithic volume.



Cement polished walls and floor becomes the main character of the space thereby providing a very minimal, earthy and clean look. Leaf impressions on the floor and wall becomes instrumental in accentuating the aesthetics of the space. The Monochromatic space in cement is complimented by wood in the form of furniture and partitions. The Main partition has been designed taking inspiration from the “Golden Ratio” adorned with a small pivoted wooden solid paneled window becoming an eye-catcher.

The table has been elegantly carved out in cement concrete emerging as a monolithic mass from the floor. The Boldness of the cement finished surfaces is balanced by the delicacy and intricacy of the wood. The cold cement finished surfaces are balanced by the warmth of wood thereby creating a subtle ambience and pleasant environment inside.

## Project Description -

The office was initially an empty space which had to be incorporated with a large set of requirements by the client. The proposed space was supposed to have a small waiting area, a receptionist table, staff arrangement for 4 people, 2 individual cabins and abundant storage. Considering all the requirements, we came up with the idea of adorning the entire furniture with the help of flutes which will make it look aesthetically pleasing. The use of flutes became a prominent feature of the space giving us clean lines and a subtle appearance which helped us render its name "Fluted Office".

The office entrance gets enriched with flutes along with large glass panels admitting light inside as well as wooden pivoted panels allowing the air flow inside. The office tables have been designed to provide a sleek look in the form of a slim table top in laminate/stone and a bold look in the form of fluted boards as the main support. The wooden decorative supports have been provided in addition to give an ornamental look to the space. The storage cupboards have been kept subtle with a nice Matt finish laminate in the common areas and the cabin storage gets embellished with wooden fluted panels and solid wood veneer surfaces. The overall lighting has been kept artful by maximising the indirect lights along with some direct sources from the ceiling. A hanging horizontal task light on the table adds to the beauty of the space.



# Waterfront Development

## a Case study of Jayanti River in Kolhapur city, Maharashtra, India.




Dr. Vandana Dhaval Pusalkar has recently completed her doctoral research in architecture (urban design) titled - "Waterfront Development a Case study of Jayanti River in Kolhapur city, Maharashtra, India." She has completed it on 3rd February, 2025 from Visvesvaraya Technological University, Belagavi, Karnataka, India under the guidance of Dr. Vimala Swamy (Professor and Principal, Gopalan School of Architecture and Planning, Bangalore, Chairperson B.O.S. and A.S. Member, V.T.U, Belagavi) and co-guide Prof. Dr Anand Shivpur (Professor, Water and Land Program, Department of Civil Engineering, Visvesvaraya Technological University, Belagavi).

Urban riverfront regeneration is a highly debated topic in the field of local planning. This is a result of the organizations' pursuit of innovative leadership and policy objectives. Waterfronts are a crucial element of urban development because they have a significant influence on the image, social equity, and untapped natural resources. Expertise in hydrology, urban planning, environmental ecology, and ecological design is necessary for the development of riverbanks. Conserving the environment is crucial, and engaging in activities along riverbanks can effectively foster social and cultural interactions. Rivers hold cultural significance in Indian civilizations, but their pristine state has become heavily contaminated, undermining their cultural significance. Rapid urbanization has led to pollution, sewage, and contaminated rivers, posing risks to public health and the environment. Urban rivers in India are often polluted, unable to support aquatic life and causing unpleasant odors. River basins hold both geographical and political importance, and sustainable revitalization of waterfront areas should focus on the entire river system.

Kolhapur, a southwestern Maharashtra district, is rich in water, with rivers like the Panchganga and Jayanti flowing through the region. However, the Panchganga has been heavily contaminated for 25 years, and the Jayanti nallah, one of the twelve nallahs, contributes significantly to pollution. The Jayanti River, a major tributary of the Panchganga River, in Kolhapur, is a major source of pollution due to its role in transporting diluted sewage.

The Jayanti River, once a sacred river, has been transformed into a Nallah due to unstructured urban development. The river, once a deity, is now on the brink of extinction due to its lack of aquatic life and biodiversity. The Jayanti riverfront, once a picturesque area, has become a dirty sewage corridor due to negligence and abandonment, threatening the city's urban centre.



The literature review highlights a significant lack of research on small urban rivers and their activities along their banks, particularly in riverfront areas. There is a lack of comprehensive efforts to address these issues, and there is a lack of established criteria for developing waterfront areas in India. The Ministry of Water Resources, River Development, and Ganga Rejuvenation is aiming to restore polluted tributaries, while Kolhapur's Jayanti River faces degradation. The challenge aims to improve social, economic, and ecological resilience in riverside areas by implementing integrated waterfront management systems, flood safety measures, and technological advancements. This study aims to develop a model for waterfront development and propose sustainable planning-based policies to restore the river's status.

The upstream, upper midstream, and downstream portions of the river, as well as their influence on urban water management, were examined in a thorough case study. This study also examines the Jayanti River's relationship with urban sustainability using back casting approach for future studies. This approach combines the SDGs with the policy framework. It focuses on the historical, current, and future conditions of the river, aiming to create a comprehensive plan for sustainable waterfront regeneration. The study uses the Delphi method to authenticate findings and evaluates the legal and policy framework for achieving sustainable waterfront regeneration.

The Jayanti River, previously known as Jivanti Nadi, is a prime example of this issue. The river's encroachment has led to overflow, flooding, and deteriorating sewer systems. Untreated sewage discharges into the nallahs, causing unhygienic conditions and the spread of disease-carrying insects. The situation is exacerbated by the river's, uncleaning, and unhygienic conditions. The Jayanti Nallah case study highlights the importance of public open spaces in Kolhapur's urban landscape. Despite unclean sewage water, Kolhapur only has 3.5% developed open spaces, below the recommended percentage. Sustainable riverfront development can provide cities and regions with a competitive advantage. Restoring and revitalizing small urban rivers can contribute to urban sustainability. Restoring the nallah and constructing public parks can enhance the river's ecology and preserve cultural heritage sites.

Legal policy framework is developed by formation of a Jayanti River Watershed Development Agency (JRWDA) here at Kolhapur to implement the SPECIAL model. A comprehensive policy framework can be developed to address the issues related to the polluted Jayanti River through riverfront regeneration. Sustainability at the watershed level has been accomplished by implementing the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals (SDG's). A model called SPECIAL (Social, Physical/Political, Economic, Cultural, Institutional Governance, Adaptive Resilience, and Legal) has been created at the Jayanti Watershed level to effectively combine the Sustainable Development Goals (SDG.s) with the policy framework as shown in chart no.1. Riverfronts connect cities, enhance aesthetics, and optimize urban design and service facilities. Sustainable riverside regeneration balances natural preservation, community engagement, economic opportunities, and cultural heritage. Rivers provide essential water for life, and a thriving urban setting requires decentralized wastewater treatment, local drainage networks, hydrological restoration, pollution reduction, and ecological landscape enhancement.

## Earle's Court

### *A Bright and Artistic Haven for Three Generations*

A tastefully-designed and decorated abode, the Earle's Court is a testament of transformative design.

A remarkable fusion of design elements that have come together to create a bright and artful living space, this is an art lovers haven.

Located on Earle's Street in Kolkata and taking inspiration from the London neighbourhood – Earl's Court – this space has been remodelled for an airy and bright abode that accommodates the needs of a three-generation family.



#### The Brief:

With a fondness for open spaces and luxurious setups, the client wanted a home that maximized floor space along with providing an airy and inviting ambience. This meant creating common areas that are spacious and well-connected, ensuring seamless circulation throughout the residence.

#### Design and Theme:

The design philosophy can be described as “modern yet timeless” as it seeks to infuse contemporary elements with an old-world appeal, creating a living space that exudes both modernity and ageless charm.

To fulfil the client's vision, a muted colour palette full of bright tones was adopted. This meant the incorporation of a lot of whites and light coloured materials such as hand-carved Ash Wood panels, Terracotta Colour Infusions, and Stucco Wall Paint effects. These were chosen to create a sense of depth and richness in the space while the Wicker Totems in the dining area and decorative lights throughout the residence contributed to the eclectic modernism, adding sculptural elements and artistic nuances to the design.



### The USP

The standout feature of the house is the extensive use of hand-carved Ash Wood panels. These panels, present in all common areas, provide a unique backdrop for various settings while also giving the space a more expansive appearance. The intricate carvings on the wood add depth and texture to the design, making them a defining feature.

The flooring in some areas features intricate inlay designs, providing a touch of artistry that elevates the overall appeal. To create a sense of expansiveness, the doors of the rooms are all seamlessly concealed within their respective areas, ensuring an unbroken flow. The marble artistry in the washrooms is a standout feature. The panda marble for the parents' bathroom creates intriguing patterns on the walls and floor, highlighting the play of light and texture.

As you move through the passage and dining areas, you'll notice three standing totems, a creative collaboration with The Wicker Story. These totems are housed within metal cabinets, adding a bespoke and artistic touch to the overall design. The entire residence flows seamlessly, with each room contributing to a light, interesting, and art-inspired atmosphere. This is a perfect fusion of different styles and elements, resulting in a unique and eclectic modern living space.

### The Rooms

A special focus on the design of individual rooms has been made to provide comfort and privacy. In the son's room, a bed takes centre stage, flanked by a study area at the back. This was done to ensure maximum privacy while including a spacious and unique bathroom. The bathroom features separate cubicles for the WC and showers, along with a distinct dressing area. The colour scheme in this room is a striking combination of black and white, reflecting the youthful spirit of the couple. To add an artistic touch, a statement was created on the floor and the walls. The room even boasts a freestanding bathtub that feels like it's straight out of a fairy tale.

The parents' room exudes a sense of simple elegance and regal charm. Muted tones of white, beige, and grey dominate the upholstery and overall colour palette, creating a serene ambiance. The room also has a bathroom adorned with exquisite black and white marble known as panda, which is broken into interesting forms, enhancing the aesthetics of the wall and floor.

On the right-hand side of the passage, is the kids' room. This space comes alive with bespoke wallpaper and furniture. Bright yellows are prominently featured, giving lively and child-friendly ambience while the room's structural columns are cleverly concealed within built-in cabinets.



## The Challenges

One significant challenge in designing this project was dealing with low ceiling height along with the complex structure of the existing building, which was 20-30 years old. To overcome these limitations, we conducted meticulous structural studies and planned the space effectively. This resulted in a seamless, well-connected residence that maximized the available space and ensured a bright and airy atmosphere.




## Conclusion




In the beginning when client approached to us he showed us the reference photographs of some luxury bungalows in Roman and modern style, which wouldn't suit the context around.

Then we suggested them an option which related to the Contemporary Maharashtrian Wada style which would suit their requirements, and was accepted.

A huge foreground was planned in the front of house. A featured Basalt stone masonry arch is designed besides the entrance with a small water body and also Gomukhs are designed from which the water is flowing into the water body, creating a welcoming space at the entrance.



We selected Basalt stone masonry for the house in a contemporary way to give essence of a traditional wada style house. A big Courtyard was planned in the centre of the house, which is the focal point of the planning.



The natural light filters through the Jali patterns in the skylight giving a dramatic play of Sciography throughout the day.

The original central staircase was reconfigured to enhance accessibility and flow. The ground floor, initially designed for stilt use, was transformed into a multifunctional space that now serves as an owner's (astrologer's) office and parking area.

The first floor, which was initially intended for two separate flats, was replanned as a 2BHK unit. This layout promotes a sense of unity and openness, allowing for seamless movement between living, dining, and kitchen areas. The design emphasizes natural light and ventilation, creating a comfortable and inviting atmosphere.



### Client Requirements:

A Shift in Vision the project underwent a significant metamorphosis to meet the needs of its inhabitants. The decision to convert the apartment into a bungalow at stilt stage was driven by a desire for more space and a connection to the surrounding environment. The client sought a home that felt inviting and spacious, with a visual identity that resonated with the essence of a bungalow. The architects embraced this challenge, crafting a design that harmonizes modern aesthetics with traditional elements.

The house sits on approximately 40'X60' corner plot with North & east facing road. The trapezoidal corner spaces in plot utilised as a balcony space in each section.

The original design was conceived as a dual-flat apartment, featuring a central staircase that effectively divided the space into two distinct living units at each floor plate.

This layout was functional for its intended purpose, providing separate access and privacy for each flat. However, as the project progressed, the client's vision evolved, necessitating a significant reimagining of the space and had a shift in a vision at stilt level.





## Stand out Features

One of the standout features of this bungalow is its opening. Maximum opening's are strategically placed at north and east to allow natural light without harsh glare so building does not gain heat. Each room is cherished with balcony and free size opening facing towards east and north.

The intricate terracotta jali work serves as a functional and decorative element, allowing natural light to filter through while providing privacy. This traditional technique is remained in a modern context, creating a dialogue between the past and the present. Making it a focal point of the design.




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# E-seeed's LATE SHRIKAR GARDE NATIONAL AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN SKETCHING.

Late Shrikar Garde was a versatile personality, artist and a disciplined practising architect in Kolhapur. He had been promoting sketching activities amongst the students since long time. His passion for sketching inspired e-seeed to hold a city level and national level competition amongst the students of architecture, that aims to create an awareness and importance about sketching. This year we could celebrate the World Architecture Day by conducting this competition in 11 cities on the same day and the same time. The activity started in 2023 with limited 2, 3 cities/ centres. But in 2024 it could become a first of its kind and made a pioneering history. This national level live sketching competition was only for the architecture students happened on 6th October (Sunday) between 9am to 11am at a time in 11 major cities which are New Delhi, Mumbai (with Navi Mumbai, Thane), Pune, Hyderabad, Indore, Lucknow, Baroda, Solapur, Kolhapur, Baramati, Satara, Nashik, Bijapur and Sangli. The venue selection liberty was extended to respective centres. The respective centres and the centre incharge handled the activity with protocols efficiently and the enthusiasm of the participants was just great. Approximate 1000 students participated and did live sketching at a time. The medium for sketching was only graphite pencil and sketching material was supposed to be carried by the participants. The A4 size paper was to be supplied by the e-seeed. The centre incharges organized an on site jury process as per the given guidelines. A small lecture or a demonstration by the eminent juries were also organized by some centres.

Second prize: Rs. 5000.


Third prize: certificate.

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# Lonar Crater Conservation

## A Legacy of Preservation

The journey of conserving the Lonar Crater and its surrounding heritage began a few years ago around 2017 when a team of E-seedians architects, conservationists, and researchers visited the site in Maharashtra's Buldhana district. The crater, a unique geological marvel, is home to 32 temples, 17 monuments, 13 kundas, and 4 inscriptions—many of which were in a state of neglect. Recognizing the urgent need for conservation, e-seed took the initiative to document, study, and develop a comprehensive restoration plan.

The primary aim of this initiative was to conserve and restore the historical, cultural, and ecological significance of Lonar Crater. Our objectives included Preserving the unique geological and ecological environment of the crater. Restoring the architectural heritage of temples and monuments. Documenting historical and cultural narratives for future reference. Creating awareness and ensuring the longevity of this site as a natural and cultural treasure of Maharashtra and India. The conservation-documentation work was undertaken through a systematic approach: A team of architects, led by Ar. Shrikant Anpat, meticulously measured and documented the structures through detailed drawings and photographs.

Following the successful documentation and conservation efforts, the team focused on:

Publishing detailed reports on the restoration work. Engaging with local authorities to implement long-term protective measures. Conducting awareness programs and educational workshops for students, researchers, and conservation enthusiasts. Proposing the inclusion of Lonar Crater in heritage tourism circuits to ensure sustainable management and visibility.





Feeling Blue in the Best Way Possible? Only at Chefchaouen, the Blue City. Every hue imaginable—cobalt, azure, and periwinkle—you name it (architects actually can). "This place is like a Smurf village," I felt, as we wandered through its winding alleys. Our ulterior motive? Lots and lots of photos. Every door, every corner seemed like it was made for cameras.



Time Traveling Among Roman Ruins: Volubilis, A history buff's paradise, transported to another era. The mosaics told stories of gods and myths, while the crumbling columns whispered tales of a once-thriving city. It was humbling to think about how civilizations rise and fall, but leave behind echoes for us to discover. There is plenty to see albeit 50 percent of the site has been excavated to date, so much more remains undiscovered!





A maze of wonders awaits us at Fez, a sensory overload in the best way possible. The medina, a labyrinth of narrow alleys filled with vibrant souks and aromatic spices. The Chouara Tannery was fascinating and pungent (let's just say we were grateful for the mint sprigs handed out at the entrance). Holding our breath, we marveled at the craftsmanship on display.



Late Evening, dirt tracking in a 4x4, a gut-wrenching adventure as we squealed into the night, deeper into the Sahara. Immersed in its ethereal beauty, the Merzouga Desert Camp. Not knowing what to expect, was a surprise!! We were shown to our sleeping tent, and it was a bedroom-style double bed in a marquee tent—talk about glamping! Our Berber hosts, were natives who live a nomadic life. Don't assume them to be ignorant; they are humble and happy with what they have, there's a lesson or two right there.

Winding Through the Heart of Morocco, Ifrane, "Little Switzerland," we took a pause to breathe in the fresh smell of conifers, the cool breeze, the European-inspired architecture and natural beauty. Then came Midelt, picturesque reliefs cut out the horizon, giving off an impression of calm and serenity , slowing giving way to the Ziz Valley, its lush palm groves and the winding Ziz River, which looked like "Western movie" at places.



A childlike happiness washed over me as I found myself around the campfire, tapping to the melodious drums and songs about Berber life. We sang (badly), laughed (loudly), and feasted our eyes on a vast and beautiful clear sky, studded with more stars than you could imagine. It's one of the world's largest dark sky reserves, with little light pollution, allowing us to spot, pretty much every constellation.

We all began counting the shooting stars into the wee hours (I won, by the way)! Sunrise over the Erg Chebbi Dunes was unforgettable—a palette of pinks and oranges, as we watched the golden dunes stretched endlessly before us! Gripping for dear life, till our knuckles were white, we swayed, clinging on camel backs, our transport to our buses. No words, just a feeling—one that I never thought I'd never experience (The soreness proved it was all real)



The bus Snaking along the Todra Gorge and Dades Valley a prehistoric scene out of Jurassic park, that took our breath away. Towering canyons (higher than the Empire State Building in New York) and a lush oasis, created by the River Todra carving its way through limestone for centuries. Silent witnesses to the history and resilience of its Berber inhabitants, frozen in time. "Can you imagine living here centuries ago?"



Hours on the Road but Never a Dull Moment: We rubbed our eyes, is it a mirage? Skoura palmeraie loomed—a lush oasis, emerging out of nothing in such an arid area. Ancient adobe fortresses, gave us an idea of what life three to four centuries ago.



A go-to spot for Hollywood, with films like Gladiator, The Mummy, The Jewel of the Nile, and even Lawrence of Arabia. Here, Daenerys Targaryen (Game of Thrones fame) was seen freeing slaves in the arid and dramatic cities. Have you ever known "eseedians" to be far behind? (Ask those who went on the tour for more tidbits about our very own production!)

Come dawn, we find ourselves marching Through "the Door of the Desert", Ouarzazate, on the trade route, nestled amidst the Atlas Mountains, Ounila Valley, a UNESCO World Heritage site of the fortified ksar (a kind of traditional pre-Saharan dwelling). It felt otherworldly,



All too soon our last pit stop, Casablanca. Conversations with broken French (deep colonial influences) & Arabic and laughter over our last cups of mint tea. We reflected on everything Morocco had given us: laughter, awe, connection, and a (con)fused version of belly dance (rummaging for video evidence). Above all, the locals, who have lived there for centuries and have gained world recognition for their traditional friendliness and cultural richness! We soaked in the music and the olive oil in khobz accompanied by jben (marinated olives), honey baghrir pancakes, and more tagines. We even replaced the traditional "smile" for the cameras with "taaaginnnee!" (Truth be told, by now, we didn't want to see or smell another tagine).



Our journey ended where it began—but this time with heavier hearts (and heavier suitcases). As our plane took off, I looked out at Morocco fading into the distance—a country so warm, a reminder that kindness transcends language or prosperity.

All those with whom I shared these moments, each is a memory I deeply cherish!

Our salute to the organizers (past life army generals who can literally tame the beast), no one does it better! So pack your bags (preferably not last minute like myself), and go, see life differently, you'll always find a home within yourself. A journey always stays with you long after you have left!



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
